In recognition of Gandhi's 148th birth date on **2 October 2017**, Durbanites and visitors to Umhlanga can take part in the International Day of Nonviolence and a prayer organised by the Counsel General of India at the nearby Phoenix Settlement, Inanda, Gandhi's one-time home in Durban and the location of his printing press where *The Indian Opinion* newspaper was published. The Indian Consulate will be conducting the celebration from 8am to 11am. All are welcome. Bring your own snacks and water to drink.

Garsons Expeditions will be conducting a non-profit tour on the same day aimed at educating children about the life and times of Gandhi. The INANDA STORY tour explores Gandhi's 21 years in South Africa. in Durban from 1893 to 1914. In Durban he developed his philosophy of Satyagraha, a powerful form of active yet peaceful resistance to political injustices that was inspired by his opposition to the discrimination that was rampant in South Africa at the time. Satyagraha influenced leaders like Martin Luther King, frustrated the likes of Winston Churchill and was astutely recognised by General Smuts as a 'force' to be reckoned with.
